ontra dance has absolutely nothing whatsoever to do with country line dancing. Nada. Zilch. And if it did, we would deny it. Okay, we admit that some people enjoy both contra dancing and country line dancing.

Contra dance groups receive absolutely no funding from Oliver North

Generally, no classes are required or even offered except for a nonrequired half-hour introduction before the dance.

We do not wear costumes (except on Halloween) or any particular style of clothes. You are encouraged to bring a separate pair of soft-soled, nonscuffing shoes to protect the dance floor. Tennis shoes are quite adequate for the first-time dancer.

Very little footwork is required in contra dance. The most common type of movement is a smooth walking step.

CALLER'S CORNER: J.P. Thom-Gronachan

hen J.P. Thom-Gronachan isn't dancing, you may find him at his downtown Tucson studio, The Musician Maker, teaching music. Or, he may be at his Marana ranch, milking a couple Nubian nannies and making goat cheese. On Sundays, 6:00 to 8:00 p.m., you can

listen to his show, Tabasco Road on KXCI Community Radio. He plays Louisiana Cajun and Zydeco dance music. He also has a five-piece band, Black Leather Zydeco.

"In 1984, after playing Old-Timey music for a number of years in Phoenix, Steve Barnett, showed up with a mountain dulcimer. His

question to us was, 'Where's your dance?' Our answer was, 'We don't know anything about that, we just play the music.'"

"Steve told us he was a dancer and caller from Vermont and he offered to teach us how to do it. That was how the Phoenix Contra dance started.

"Before he returned to Vermont, I took a couple calling workshops from Steve.

"I learned that there was already a dance community in Tucson. I attended a Tucson dance and found 50-100

dancers who had a good idea of what was going on. This contrasted sharply with the low attendance at the Phoenix dances.

"I was a bad caller in those days and I couldn't dance too well, either. The dancers put up with me and I learned. In 1987-88, I called monthly dances in Prescott and Flagstaff. While I was behind the mic, I couldn't dance, so I came to Tucson as often as I could to be just a dancer.

"In 1991, I started attending weekend dance camps in California and it was during that time that I came to consider myself a caller. I learned a lot from George Marshall. I developed an appreciation for smooth connections, precise timing, and interesting combinations of moves.

"I program an evening with progressively more challenging dances but I

add few less complex dances to provide mental relief.

"Of course, it's always great to see a dance go perfectly. Sometimes, the dances that feel best start with a little confusion and then progress and get smoother. The dancers have the satisfaction of solving a puzzle.

"I'm now only calling 3 or 4 dances a year, but it keeps my repertoire fresh. I no longer end up calling everything I know."


