



role, the call is woman's chain. You like to gauge your, "leader role," on your understanding of the experience level of the dancer with whom you're interacting. So, you're thinking, "straight courtesy turn," or, "a twirl or two," but something with connection.

The next neighbor woman

pulls across and suddenly

your hand is thrust upwards and she starts twirling. The first time, you're caught a bit off guard. But the next time, you pull your hand away, and she just spins away, no interplay between the two of you, no connection whatsoever. This scene has happened to me a number of times.

Connection is a large part of why many of us are drawn to contra dance. There is the connection to the phrase of

the music, the connection to your partner,

and the connection to the other dancers. Now, don't get me wrong, I enjoy twirling. I've enjoyably experienced it from both sides, as twirler and twirlee, and I will continue to do so. But, for everything gained there is something lost.

What is diminished in twirling is the connection between the two dancers. A courtesy turn is a brief moment of engaging interaction. In a normal courtesy turn, there is a chance to give delicious weight as you engage each others eyes. There is even time to chat a bit. Your bodies are closer together: it's more of a "cuddle." (Some of the best dancers with whom I've had the privilege to dance never twirled, and it felt great!)

As twirls are introduced, this connection diminishes. A single twirl at the end of a courtesy turn doesn't lose much, but the earlier the pivotal hand goes up, the less eye and body contact there is. The extreme is the scenario already described. Not only that, but often, twirling leads to being out of position when



DANCE IN THE DESERT

t's time to make plans to attend the Eleventh Annual Dance in the

Desert contra camp. This popular event at the Triangle Y Ranch Camp outside Oracle, Arizona is attended by dancers from all over the world. In addition to fabulous bands, great callers and extraordinary workshops, the scenery is magnificent.

This year's featured band is Lift Ticket. "We danced to them last night in San Rafael," a California contra dancer wrote, "and even after doing a weekend dance camp at Dance Awakening, they were terrific. Really rocked! Your camp, Dance In The

Desert, should be great."

Lift Ticket is made up of seasoned musicians with extraordinary ranges of styles; from major choir singing to

Quebecois, Scottish, Irish.

This year's callers will be Nils Fredland and Laura Brown.

the music dictates the onset of the next figure. When that happens, it's rude to the entire set. (It is easy to lose sight of the fact that, when we dance, we are connecting to an entire set. When we get off time with that set, we are losing that connection, too.)

The decision to twirl requires the consent of both people, and either can deny it. If the "turner" wants to invite a twirl, she or he starts to lift the joined

left hands. If the "turnee" wants to accept, he or she engages in the lift. If not, the "turnee" keeps her or his lefthand low, and a n o r m a l courtesy turn

I use these words, "turner," and "turnee," because, in traditional contra dancing, there is no leader or follower. Although sex roles are defined, the roles are complete, and everyone knows exactly what to do to carry out their part of the dance. Thus, there is no leading or following.

The position I promote and follow (with room for playfulness, and mistakes) is first, that, "no twirl," is the default, and second, if a flourish makes you fall behind the phrase of the music, don't do it.

CD REVIEW: CAMPTOWN, JOE CRAVEN

oe Craven performed for many years with the David Grisman Quintet, teaming up with Grisman and Jerry Garcia on many projects. Grisman has called him "the world's most versatile sideman," but for some time now he's been enjoying an independent career, and his classic CD Camptown (1995) has just been re-

by opening the kitchen cupboard and using what came out. A glance at the instruments listed in the liner notes reveals mayonnaise and Mason jars, cheese grater and silverware tray, as well as the more traditional spoons. Talk about your kitchen musicians.

Found objects aside, let me assure you that this CD is a gem. Principally a percussionist with Grisman, Craven is also a gifted mandolin and fiddle player. His rhythms are always right on the mark, regardless of what he's playing, and they form the foundation for some of the most interesting and innovative treatments of traditional

fiddle tunes I've heard. Craven has captured the beauty of traditional fiddle tunes, mostly Celtic and American, and set them, with seemingly effortlessly virtuosity, within a variety of worldwide musical traditions.

Selections include: A haunting, Asian-inspired Star of the County Down featuring Japanese koto (a stringed instrument) and flute. The New Iberians is a Cajun-influenced medley of Dixie Hoedown, Elzic's Farewell, and Eighth of January. Craven's

percussion licks stand out on *Combolé*, a combination of the

> American tune Sail Away Ladies and the Irish reel Paddy on the Turnpike, performed in Cuban charanga

style. Listening to the Irish reel The Little Beggar Man (a.k.a. The Red-Haired Boy) on the track The Fez of Abu, you'll feel like you're in a market in ancient Baghdad. Other tracks are inspired by music from South Africa, Puerto Rico, India, Brazil, the Caribbean, and Australia.

You can attend a workshop and house concert with Joe Craven here in Tucson on Thursday, May 11. The workshop is 6 pm-7:30 pm and the concert is scheduled for 8 pm. 

SPREADING THE JOY OF THE JAM

In the March, 2006 issue, TFTM President, Dale Tersey, in his "Live and Local column wrote about the twice-monthly (first and third Tuesday) jam at the Rincon Market. For more than 20 years, the Albuquerque New Mexico Folk Music and Dance Society (NM FolkMADS) has had an active jam-group called Megaband. Musicians get together

at the Blue Dragon Coffee Shop once a month to practice, and then again to play for a contra dance.

The Megaband Jam was initially formed to provide an opportunity for less accomplished musicians to play for dances and to make sure there was a good supply

of musicians to play for dances when the established bands had conflicts. The Megaband has been quite successful, thus, it's worth considering what has contributed to this success.

Clearly, the most important factor has been the Megaband's inclusive nature. The jam tends towards anarchy; membership in FolkMADS is not required, there isn't formal membership in the Megaband, and the nominal leaders are simply a few experienced musicians who know the

most tunes. While there have been some awkward evenings when somebody shows up with a horn or wants to play world beat music, even the most thick-skinned soul quickly figures out that the Megaband plays only traditional, old-time music and there isn't much opportunity to show off one's virtuosity. If someone is really out of hand, encouragement might be review the Ten given to Commandments of Jamming. Old time music is basically happy music and in

that spirit, as with the Rincon Market Jam, the Megaband is a friendly, non-judgmental organization. Beginners are welcomed to the group and become members as soon as somebody can remember their name.

Because of its tendency towards chaos, one thing the Megaband

doesn't do well is keep an up-to-date tune list. Some years ago one of the members recorded about 50 tunes during practice, converted them to MP3 files and this has become the core repertoire. The FolkMADS newsletter, and now the TFTM newsletter, features a "Tune of the Month" column that is another source of new tunes and musical ideas for the group.

While it's fun to practice, the opportunity to perform provides incentive for participants to work a little harder. And playing for a dance

adds an amazing amount of energy to a good, old-time tune. While the quality of the music is variable, the dancers almost always feed off the enthusiasm of a stage full of musicians pumping out "the big band sound."

Over the years a lot of beginners have joined and stayed with the group, and a number of these folks have developed musically to the point that they've joined working bands and new bands have formed.

Megaband has helped increase the number of pickers and improved the level of musicianship in the traditional music scene in New Mexico through cross-pollination of musical ideas and tunes. I think you've seen the same thing in Tucson.

Like the Rincon Jam, the Megaband provides a friendly and stimulating social environment for traditional musicians to get together, swap tunes and tales, and enjoy the company of folks with similar interests.

If you're coming to Albuquerque, check the FolkMADS web site to find information on dances and Megaband practices. Foreigners are always welcome. And I hope to join all of you at a Rincon Market Jam one of these days.



TEN COMMANDMENTS OF JAMMING

(Compiled from forgotten web sites & adapted for the Albuquerque Megaband)

- Pay attention to what's going on. Sit so that you can see and hear the other musicians.
- Keep the beat, do not rush, do not drag.
- 3. Keep your instrument in tune and play in tune.
- Play extra softly if someone is singing.
- 5. The musician who starts a tune generally ends it. Refer to Rule 1
- Be mindful of the banjo section; do not change keys more often than necessary.
- Do not practice licks on your instrument between tunes.
- Do not come to a jam session expecting to impress others with your virtuosity. Jam sessions are opportunities to share tunes and songs.
- Play some tunes that everybody knows.
- 10. It is never a sin to play too softly.


