Ain't No Dust On Me--The Dusty Buskers

There are probably as many definitions of Old Time music as there are people doing the defining. This one refers to mountain stringband music and a mutant modern incarnation that blends Irish and a bit of Bluegrass and folk into their own modern take on Old Time mountain music. The mutant moderns call themselves the Dusty Buskers.

The Dusty Buskers. A catchy band name. And not just the name. Their web sites will grab your attention, too. These guys were not on the John McCain media consultation list. They are Gen Internet. They're plugged in to the Net but good. And, with their

musical names being Fiddlin' Phoenix and Dusty Squirrelfisher, Cousin Dylan and Mighty Joel, you might get an inkling that something different is up. It is. And it isn't. It's both. The old and new collided in a musical cyclotron and out popped the Dusty Buskers.

The Buskers had a gig in the center of Old Bisbee at the Bisbee Coffee Company's bare-bones outdoor stage just a few steps from the town's main post office. In front of the Wells Fargo office across the street the Women In Black For Peace were holding a vigil. It was late on Halloween afternoon. Nobody seemed to have advertised the Busk-

ers' performance. No audience, except for a handful of raggedy homeless people and Broken String, a Cochise County Old Time/Irish stringband who came to hear them. Then the Buskers launched into their colorful and frenetic adrenalin-charged show and the audience that wasn't, was, There was considerable foot traffic around the post office. People heard the music on the street and drifted in. They were soon hollering their appreciation.

And some audience it was. This was after all Halloween In Bisbee. Ghosts and goblins, witches and monsters and assorted other costumedup characters were pausing on their way to the famously creative-juiced Bisbee loween parties. Add to that the Women In Black For Peace from across the street. whose eyes and ears had noticed the band. And some band they were watching. A wild-haired punked out group that was one half Old Time Wild Men and the other half rowdy Irish Bar Band. It was a hell of a sight. The Women In Black For Peace and a Halloween-costumed audience watching a freaked-out punk

Old Time band decked out in thrift-store-sheik clothing no less bizarre than the audience. Even for eclectic weirded-out Bisbee, it was an eye-popping sight. And it fit nicely into the Dusty Buskers' own off-the-wall view of themselves

A couple of years ago the Old Time Herald ran an article about young people coming into Old Time music from punk rock. Gadzooks! Punk rockers in Old Time? What in the devil would that be like? The strange thought was still hanging in mental digestive limbo when some of those thrift-store-dressed punkers showed up at the 2006 Tucson fiddle contest in Reid They called them-Park. Ales selves the Ramblin' The generations met head on as the punked-out young Ales hunkered around a picnic table jamming away with the graving geezers--Big Jim Griffith and the Arthritis Brothers--to the raw and rough edges back porch stringband tunes. In odd counterpoint to the jamming of the Ales and the Geezers, the

contest was going just on the edge of hearing over on the nearby stage. The fiddle contest main-streamers didn't seem to notice, but the passersby sure did. Sensing the energy and excitement of the impromptu young/old jam, an enthralled crowd started to Then the contest build up. over, everyone was home and the colorful little group of punk Old Timers seemed to disappear from the radar screen of local Old Time music. It was like a comet had flashed vividly across the musical sky and then was gone.

Not so. They were still there. Below the radar. The Ramblin' Ales split. Some of them went back east and hit a bunch of the Old Time and Bluegrass festivals that summer and came back incandescent with their own vision of Old Time music. But Fiddlin' Phoenix and Dusty stayed in Tucson and worked on honing their street musicians' busking act. They morphed into the Dusty Buskers, filling out their sound with Cousin Dylan on mandolin and Mighty Joel Ford on washboard. A doghouse thumper is likely the next addition. The formerly underground Dusty Buskers came up for air--at least some of the time--and are performing with increasing frequency. You can catch them at the Fourth Avenue Winter Street Fair in mid-December. Or check their web sites for gig dates.

The Buskers don't have the finely honed charged musicianship of the Privy Tippers contra dance band or the Round The House Irish band. They don't have the rock solid Old Time professionalism of Dan and Jennifer Levenson or the bodhran-flavored sound of another Old Time/Irish band, Cochise County's Broken But they do have a Strina. wild, balls-to-the-wall way of performing Old Time and Irish music that will not fail to grab When these vour attention. boys are on stage, they ARE on stage! If they played in a cemetery, even the ground would probably start rocking.

Leader Fiddlin' Phoenix is an ain't-no-fat-on-me dynamo whose onstage persona is one part Karate Kid doing the Stork and one part Gid Tanner fiddling wild man. His onstage performance is manic. Probably offstage, too.

The quy is intense. He doesn't just play music. He is the music That balls-to-the-wall manic intensity carries over to the entire Zany, agreeably diband. sheveled co-leader Dustv Squirrelfisher plays quitar and harmonica and sings harmony, with lanky Cousin Dylan's mandolin and Mighty Joel's washboard fillina OUT the They might sound. strange as hell in their mismatched 60's cast-off clothand their ing. with foot-stomping onstage antics, but these guys can actually play their instruments sing spot-on harmonies while putting on one hell of an entertaining act showcasing their mixture of Old Time. Irish and a hint of Bluegrass music.

In a very real sense, they are musical ambassadors for Old Time music. And, in another very real sense, the Buskers are a palpable link to those wild Old Time bands from the earliest days of recorded music. These young dudes might shock the staid among us and set the more hidebound to grumbling. But you better believe that they get the attention of young people. And without young people Old

Time music has no future.

It'd just be another fading tombstone in the untended graveyard of forgotten old music.


