PURCHASING A CONCER-TINA...by Bill Bowman

At few months ago we ran an article on the concertina (kinds, records, etc.). Now what can you do if you want to learn to play one, would you go to your local music store and buy it? Only if you didn't know what you wanted and didn't know what to look

The best thing to do is to purchase an old Lachenal or Wheatstone (there are other good old ones but these are the best known) but these are extremely hard to find, especially in the Southwest.I first purchased a old Wheatstone that needed repair -- new bellows and reed work -- and sent it to Stinson Bhhlen in TExas, but after six months of waiting he sent it back because there's noone around who can make new bellows. If you can't find an old indtrument in good condition and you want an English style you can write Oliver Heatwole in Washington, D.C. He has them for \$200 postpaid with case and instruction book. Mine took two weeks to get here- it was sent to an accordion shop in California to be checked out and then sent on to me.



D means draw out, P means push together. Numbers are for buttons, front row first. On the left hand buttons are numbered up from the bottom, on the right hand, down from the top. A dot means St. Patrick's Day in the ... left hand.

WHISKEY BEFORE BREAKFAST NORMAN BLAKE Rounder 0063 (\$6.98)

Rounder has subtitled this disc "Norman Blake's Guitar Album" and critics have subtitled it "THE Norman Blake album" or

*his best yet." It is all of these. The fourteen cuts on the album include four written by Blake and five vocals. The vocals and the other tunes are traditional with five cuts, two of which are

medleys, being fiddle tunes. Charlie Collins plays a fine back-up guitar on three cuts and the rest is all Norman.

No mandolin, no dobro, nofiddle, no viola, no cello. Just guitar or guitar with voice.

After Doc Watson, I rate

Blake as my favorite traditional guitarist. His work is straightforward and unaffected. He can embellish a tune without making it overly ornate. He is fast, but not so fast that he seems to be trying to dazzle the listener with sheer speed. Most of all, he is unbeleivably clean and has an uncanny instinct for coaxing just the right tonal quality from his instrument. Norman's wife Nancy wrote

ing the world how he has his guitar set up to get that tone. It's just a simple matter of mechanics, see? Space prohibits a detailed discussion of all the cuts. Suffice it to say

that the flat-pick instru-

mentals are the best.

There are enough of them that, if for no other feason, the record is worth buying, but Blake's finger-style and vocals are good too.

If you're a guitarist this record will either inspire you or make you want to break your fingers. Whether you play or not it is must listening if you want to hear guitar playing at its best. by Dave Huet

It looks from the note he sent us that it will be a good one...18 tunes including Arkansas Traveler, Sailor's Hornpipe, Leather Britches, London-Derry Hornpipe, Red Haired Boy(Little Beggarman) Under the Double Eagle, Scottish Fiddle Pipes, Turkey in the Straw, Tia's Breakdown, Wildwood Flower Over the Waves Waltz, Irish Wash Woman, Dance All Night, Jessie Polka, Smash the Windows Jig, Orange Blossom Special, plus two song tunes, an Irish song and an oldtimey song.
